

1 you do anything in their presence?

2 A. I can't remember anything.

3 Q. Did you show any photographs to the
4 offender at any time?

5 A. Yes, I did. He had stated that it was an
6 old lady. There were a number of Polaroid
7 photographs. I had him look through the
8 photographs.

9 When he got to the victim,
10 [REDACTED] he said, that's the woman that I was
11 talking about on January 9, 1993, the one that I
12 robbed with a knife and then ejaculated on.

13 Q. Now, when did you show him these
14 photographs?

15 A. It was after the completion of his
16 statement.

17 Q. The oral or the written?

18 A. The oral statement.

19 Q. I'm showing you what has been previously
20 marked as People's Exhibits Number 1 through 8.
21 Do you recognize this stack of photographs?

22 A. Yes, I do. These were the photographs
23 that were shown to the defendant on that night
24 after he had given me the oral statement.

1 Q. Is the photograph that the defendant
2 picked out in that stack of photographs?

3 A. Yes, it is.

4 Q. Would you tell us which photograph it is
5 based on the identification number?

6 A. Yeah. It's People's Exhibit Number 3.

7 Q. How do you know that is the photograph
8 that the defendant picked out as his victim from
9 January 9th of 1993?

10 A. Once he picked out this photograph, I
11 asked him to sign his name and to number the
12 photograph number three.

13 Q. Do you see that signature anywhere on
14 that photograph?

15 A. Yes, it's on the front of the Polaroid as
16 well as the number, three.

17 Q. And what marks did you place on that
18 photograph?

19 A. I didn't place any marks on the
20 photograph.

21 Q. Thank you.

22 Do these photographs fairly and
23 accurately depict the way they looked back on
24 January 29th of 1993?

1 A. Yes.

2 Q. After the defendant picked out [REDACTED]
3 [REDACTED] as his victim, what did you do?

4 A. Then I had the detectives leave the --
5 and this was after we had discussed a handwritten
6 or court-reported statement. The detectives left
7 the interview room.

8 I wanted to talk to the defendant
9 by himself to make sure that he wasn't threatened
10 in any way to give the statement or that he wasn't
11 coerced in any way, and to make sure he had been
12 treated well by the police and myself and to make
13 sure that if he needed to use the bathroom or
14 needed anything else to eat or drink, that he got
15 it at that time.

16 Q. And what did you learn?

17 A. I learned that he said that no one forced
18 him or threatened him in any way, that he had had
19 food to eat, and he had, I think, coffee and cola
20 to drink, and that he was fine.

21 Q. After you met with the defendant alone,
22 what did you do?

23 A. Then I left the interview room to begin
24 writing the handwritten statement.
